Some documents require section breaks and you may wish to put a line into your work. Word provides easy shortcuts for this. To create a single line across your paper type three consecutive hyphens and hit enter. To create a bold line type three consecutive underscores and hit enter. And to create a double line across the page type three consecutive equal signs and hit enter. These shortcuts can help save you some time, especially working on permission slips or similar documents that are completed in sections.
